Youngstown Vindicator: Tax dollars for renovation of Ohio church schools blasted.

The <u>Vindicator article</u> identifies some of the players in the campaign to torpedo public school districts. The spokesperson for the Ohio Senate is credited with a quote that indicates that the opponents of the voucher scheme are the "left" that vilify parents who send their students to a school of their choice. The lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the EdChoice voucher scheme is not a politically partisan issue. Folks in both parties—Democrat and Republican--and Independents oppose voucher schemes.
